International students are disproportionately affected by food insecurity











- "International students were two to three times more likely to be food insecure than their counterparts" 1
- "32% of international students were food insecure, with 73% of students experiencing moderate stress.2

Food Insecurity Can Negatively Affect Students' Health and Study

- **Food Insecurity:** Beyond food shortage; includes access to nutritious and culturally appropriate foods.
- Impact on Students: Chronic health issues, academic challenges, and well-being.
- Vulnerability of International Students: Financial, cultural, and systemic barriers.

A Case Study on International Students in

Hungary₃

- Cultural heritage significantly influences dietary habits
- Students maintain their cultural and nutritional values through local and sustainable food choices
- → **Strengths**: Cultural openness, and support for local economies.
- → Weaknesses: Variability in sustainability interest.
- → **Opportunities**: Increased demand for high-quality, healthy foods.
- → Threats: Challenges in meeting diverse dietary needs.



A Case Study on International students in Australia₄

30% of surveyed students experienced food insecurity, with half facing hunger.

Consequences:

Significant impact on students' well-being and academic success.

Recommendations:

Enhanced support services and educational interventions.




A Case Study on International Students in Canada₅
