STUDENT UTILIZATION

Our strategic priorities are to connect with Husky Success Series (HSS) communities by creating partnerships to develop educational workshops. In doing so we also provide opportunities for training student leaders and foster a culture where we are inspired to be an active part of the community. Our biggest goal has been to create an infrastructure that includes organizational processes and staffing that includes student leaders. This has allowed us to improve our communication channels and increased our ability to reach out directly into the community. We are now providing programming that is based on direct student feedback and involvement which allows us to create higher impact programming and achieve more than we can alone.

This funding request is made to support the development of HSS services to include delivering educational workshops and include an opportunity for student leadership on campus. Our funding is not related to any academic programming but it is a supplement to help them guide them into academic career paths through extra-curricular activities via workshops that explore strengths, interests, success and self-care tools. Since its inception in 2014, HSS has been funded from the University Academic Advising (UAA) operational budget. Each year, UAA seeks other sources of funding and partners with departments across campus to share the financial responsibility and collaborate together to offer programming. Our programming aims to be creative, innovative, culturally as well as socially relevant and delivered from a student perspective.

The Husky Success series is a student-led organization guided by a professional academic advisor from UAA and does not receive academic funding. Our programming is initiated by undergraduate students and is open to all new and current undergraduates. We rely heavily on the volunteer contributions of student leaders across campus. Due to the growth of programming and partnerships on campus we have expanded to include a dedicated student staff worker to assist with communication, planning, administration, marketing etc. By funding this position we are able to offer more opportunities for students to work on campus and contribute overall to campus opportunities for students who are experiencing financial need and looking for student employment opportunities with leadership opportunities.

HSS service goals have included partnering with the Office of Global Affairs, Court 17, Psychological & Wellness Services, First Gen Fellows, the Pantry, with ASUWT, the Center for Equity and Inclusion, the Teaching and Learning Center, and New Student & Family Programs. Student Involvement as well as the Veterans Military Center. HSS goals are to create a position for a pre-major senator to sit on our advisory board as a permanent role moving forward. This position will be created in partnership with ASUWT's vision and goals for the upcoming year. We are also partnering with the AAPI Thrive Grant to support the Inaugural Student Conference at UW Tacoma. Our goals are to provide:

Current programming includes:

- First year and Transfer Connect events in partnership with New Student & Family Programs to connect incoming students with campus leaders and peers.
- Partnerships with local businesses on Pacific Ave and surrounding area to include Anthem Coffee & Tea, Starbucks, Campfire Cafe, S LEVEL TEA, and The Rock Wood Fired Pizza, and Tinkertopia
- Programming support with the AAPI Thrive Grant for the inaugural Student Conference.
- · Partnerships with the Center of Equity and Inclusion to promote and participate in Multicultural events and programs.
- · Engagement and outreach opportunities for student leaders.
- Experiential Learning Workshop: Partnerships with First Gen Fellows, SET/SIAS
- New partnerships with Library Makerspace, Disability Resources for Students.

Upcoming programming will include:

- · A partnership with the Office of Global Affairs to showcase study abroad events.
- Future partnerships include the Milgard School of Business, Health Care Leadership, and the School of Engineering and Technology to offer a panel of leaders from women and minority owned businesses.
- · Programming to feature minors offered at UW Tacoma.
- · Programming to feature new Bachelor degrees
- · Supporting registration initiatives on campus

STUDENT UTILIZATION (COMPARISON OVER PAST 2 YEARS)

Over the past five years HSS has increased participation from 5 students up to 130 plus by partnering with other departments. In 2018-2019, we saw our first partnership with First Gen Fellows followed shortly by the Office of Global Affairs. Since then our partnerships have expanded to include the following; the Center for Equity and Inclusion, New Student and Family Programs, Court 17, and Student Engagement, ASUWT, Disability Resources for Students, the Teaching and Learning Center, and AAPI Thrive. Our partnerships have extended to academic departments such as the School of Engineering and Technology, the School of Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences, the School of Education, Healthcare Leadership, as well as the Milgard School of Business.

Our initiatives have also focused on creating off campus partnerships to include MultiCare and surrounding Pacific Avenue businesses, and the Washington Alaskan Malamute Adoption League. Our programming is targeted towards pre-major students but all undergraduate students are welcomed and invited to participate. By utilizing partnerships we are able to increase the number of workshops, programs, events, and activities that we offer and participate in per academic year which allows for greater engagement with students. Going forward, we will utilize technology such as DawgDen to track attendance and demographic information and as we partner with different organizations we will be able to reach a wider demographic.

Our participants benefit from the opportunity to engage in programming that aims to be creative, innovative, culturally and socially relevant and delivered from a student perspective. HSS is a student-led organization and does not receive academic funding. Our programming is initiated by undergraduate students and is open to all new and current undergraduates and is open to being inclusive to graduate students who would also like to participate.

Most recently our annual Freshmen/Transfer Connect Event hosted and served 130 +students which showed an increase from 75 students the year prior and is the largest number we have served to date. This event incorporated surrounding communities and businesses from Pac Ave, and partnered with student leaders from eight campus organizations to offer unique opportunities to student leaders from different programs to cross collaborate on programming. Additionally, our support of registration events saw an increase from 20 students to 100 students over a 2 day period. We estimate serving 500 + students with direct and partner programming and implementation.

COLLECTION OF FEEDBACK & IMPROVEMENTS

We continue to develop HSS social media platforms to gather student feedback and requests for future programming. We will be implementing surveys and sign in sheets at all future events. Since changing the direction of the HSS series we have been able to incorporate direct student feedback on what programming students would like to see, what partnership and collaborations would benefit the campus.

Gathering feedback and input directly from students has increased our ability to intentionally connect with students by including student leaders who sit on the HSS advisory board. We work with representatives from ASUWT, Pack Advisors, Student Advising Mentors, Student Engagement, the Center for Equity and Inclusion, the Office of Global Affairs, the Teaching and Learning Center, First Gen Fellows, and Disability Resources for Students and are continually expanding our partners.

The inaugural student and staff HSS team was created in 2020. This collaborative team has fostered a sense of community and connectedness. Students are being offered an opportunity to gain leadership skills and to work with other student leaders from different departments, majors, and programs. We have an increased sense of pride and a firm belief that the structure we are creating will now provide the framework for HSS to be more impactful in the future, and directly address the needs of the campus, by responding with strong and intentional programming that is requested directly by students, and delivered by student leaders with the guidance, support and resources of academic advisors across campus. By providing this programming we are able to take the support offered by academic advisors directly into the student population so that students continuously have access. We have increased our awareness of what students need and are increasing the awareness of the community by looking at ways to provide creative and innovative programming. We are also creating a chance for student leaders to have more platforms to impact the community and create a legacy on campus.


